eft alone in the Thal silo. the Doctor examines the rocket, unaware that the guard is regaining consciousness. As the Doctor touches a metal grating at the base of the scaffolding, the guard crawls to a control panel and hits a button. The grating is suddenly flooded with

a massive electrical charge. The Doctor is pinned to the grating by the energy, his face contorted in agony. He blacks out.

The Doctor slowly awakens to the sound of explosions. He's propped up against the wall in the Thal military intelligence headquarters. Officials are watching a monitor showing the Kaled dome. Thanks to the information supplied to them by Davros and Nyder, the Thals' weapons are beginning to weaken it. The Thal leader turns

to the others with a triumphant smile and says, "It's working! The Kaled dome is breaking up! Start the countdown for the rocket launch!" The

Doctor protests but is too weak to do anything.

He watches a countdown clock begin to tick away at 50 seconds. 49... 48...

Inside the Kaled bunker, Davros, Nyder and the Elite scientists are also watching the destruction of the dome. Kavell is horrified, "How could the Thals have found the formula to destroy our dome?" he asks. Nyder feigns anger. "Someone has betrayed us!" Davros plays along, stating that the traitor has brought about the extermination of the Kaleds...

The Doctor stares at a destruct button for the Thal rocket as the countdown nears its end. He hurls himself towards it but is knocked back by several soldiers. The rocket is launched and hits the Kaled dome, obliterating it in a ball of fire.



The explosion shakes the Kaled bunker. Davros turns away from the monitor. "We will avenge the annihilation of our people with a retaliation so massive, so merciless, that it will live in history!" he snarls. He flicks a switch and three Daleks glide into the room. Davros accuses Ronson of being the traitor and orders the Daleks to exterminate him. Ronson screams in agony as he is killed. Davros orders the Daleks to obey their programming and carry out their mission. They move off...

Mass cheering can be heard throughout the Thal dome as the people realise that the thousand-year war has finally ended. The Thal leader is overioved. He considers having the Doctor punished but decides to be magnanimous in victory; he orders all prisoners to be pardoned and released.



The Doctor is left with a young woman, Bettan. The Doctor tells her of the Daleks, and the real reason why Davros turned on his own people. Bettan doesn't understand and leaves.

Davros hands Gharman a list of chromosomal variations to be introduced to the Dalek embryos. Gharman points out that they will result in creatures with no sense of right or wrong, conscience or pity. Davros agrees, but demands that Gharman obey him without question. The scientist complies and departs. Nyder tells Davros that the Daleks are all in position.



The Doctor has changed back into his normal clothing and makes his way past a group of celebrating Thal soldiers. The men turn a corner to find two Daleks waiting for them. "Exterminate!" is the last word the soldiers hear as the Daleks cut them down with their energy beams. The Doctor hears their cries and races back in their direction. He runs into Bettan and pulls her into an alcove just before the Daleks glide past them. Bettan agrees to help the Doctor get out of the Thal dome and back into the Wastelands.



Davros tells his scientists that their work on other projects must be halted. Only the Daleks matter now. The frightened men listen as he screams, "Nothing must delay this glorious project!"

The Doctor and Bettan reach a deserted outpost in the Wastelands and take a moment to catch their breath. They have witnessed the fall of the Thal dome under the merciless Dalek assault. The Doctor says that the Thal survivors have to be assembled into a fighting force to attack the Kaled bunker. "Destroy Davros and you destroy the Daleks," he says. Bettan agrees to try to rally the survivors. The

Doctor continues on towards the bunker. The Doctor returns to the caves that he and Harry had earlier used to escape the bunker. He is attacked by Mutos but is saved by Sevrin, Harry and Sarah. The Doctor is overjoyed to find that his friends have survived. They explain that they never reached the Kaled dome because they were attacked by Mutos. Harry realised that the Doctor would eventually return to the caves. Sarah learns that without the confiscated Time Ring, they will never be able to leave Skaro.

The Time Ring is still sitting on Ronson's desk. Gharman subtly motions for Kavell to join him there. The two men whisper to each other, trying not to be overheard by Nyder's men. Gharman tries to convince Kavell that they must stop the production of more Daleks, but Kavell is fearful, remembering Ronson's fate. "If the whole of the Scientific Corps act against Davros, he can't proceed!" Gharman says. He urges Kavell to talk to the other scientists and gain their support. But the two men are unaware that Nyder is close by, listening to them...

The Doctor asks Sevrin to find Bettan in the trenches and get the Mutos to join forces with her and the Thal survivors. The Doctor, Sarah and Harry continue on their path to the bunker.

Nyder approaches Gharman and asks to talk to him. Gharman is surprised to see the normally stoical Security Chief looking shaken. Nyder whispers to him that Davros has become a megalomaniac. "He's ready to sacrifice everything and everyone – including us – just so that

#### DARING INSPIRATION

Producer Philip Hinchcliffe took an interest in the initial design of Davros. "When it came to Davros, I said to John Friedlander that I had remembered from my childhood this comic called The Eagle which had a space hero called Dan Dare. And the big foe of Dan Dare was the Mekon who was a character who had virtually no body. [He was] incapacitated in some way but he had this big, green, dome-like head. And I said to John, 'Look, I've just got a feeling something like that might work." The Mekon and Dan Dare were the creations of British cartoonist Frank Hampson. The Dan Dare comic strip was launched in the first issue of The Eagle in 1950 and ran until the title's conclusion in 1969.

The atmospheric shadows and eerie colours on display throughout Genesis of the Daleks are thanks to the talents of Duncan Brown, who arranged the studio lighting. "The sense of gloom comes straight out of one's head," he commented. "Well, it actually comes from the script. If you read the script properly, you'll know what it feels like. The rest of it is up to you and is not that difficult." Philip Hinchcliffe praised Brown's work on the story: "It was all part of the thing of, 'Let's try and make the world of the Daleks and the Daleks themselves emerge from the shadows.' You don't see the joins in the scenery, you don't see that the Daleks are made of wood if you just take [the lighting] down, but that takes a very good





the Dalek Project can be completed." Gharman agrees to meet Nyder in private on the lower level.

The Doctor, Sarah and Harry narrowly avoid getting grabbed by Davros' giant clams. "I'll never eat oysters again!" Sarah says. They find the ventilation shaft and start crawling down it.

Gharman enters a dimly lit detention cell on the lower level and meets with Nyder. Gharman says that he and the scientists plan to deliver Davros an ultimatum: they will only continue with the Dalek Project if he agrees to restore the Daleks' minds. "The creature must have a moral sense; a judgement of right and wrong." If Davros fails to agree, they will destroy all of his



work. Gharman lists all the scientists on his side. Nyder's manner suddenly changes. "Thank you. That's what I wanted to know," he says loudly. Davros glides out of the shadows. Gharman tries to run but Nyder brings him down with a blow to his head. Davros says that after some brain surgery, Gharman will still be of use to them. Nyder and Davros hear a metallic banging noise and realise that someone is inside the ventilator shaft...

Nearby, the Doctor, Sarah and Harry exit the shaft. The corridor lights come on and they find Davros and Nyder, gun in hand, waiting for them. The trio are soon restrained and placed inside an interrogation room. The Doctor speaks to Davros for the first time. Davros is intrigued by the earlier interrogation report that suggests the intruders could be travellers in time and space. The Doctor tells Davros that the Daleks are known in the future only for the destruction they cause. He suggests that Davros could still change them into a force for good. Davros realises that the Doctor has seen the Daleks in battle and wants to know if they always win. "Not always," the Doctor replies. Davros demands to know details of the Daleks' defeats in the future. "No, Davros," the Doctor says. "That is a question that the future must keep secret." Davros tells the Doctor that he will answer him because he has a weakness that has been removed from the Daleks: "You are afflicted with a conscience..."

In the Wasteland trenches. Bettan and Sevrin have gathered a group of Thal soldiers and Mutos together. Bettan says



that they will attack the bunker as soon as their numbers are strong enough.

Nyder has placed Sarah and Harry on platforms and attached several devices to their bodies. Davros tells the Doctor that he will answer his questions truthfully or the Doctor's friends will be tortured. "I can create in their bodies all the torments and agonies ever known," he says. Davros demonstrates by turning a dial. Sarah and Harry suddenly wince in pain. The Doctor knows that if he talks, he will be betraying millions of people in the future. He refuses to speak. "You will tell me!" Davros cries. The machines intensify the pain. "You will tell me!" Davros yells again. "YOU WILL TELL ME!"



#### SCULPTING DAVROS

lighting director because it means there's more work to be done in the studio recording time. It needs someone with an artistic sensitivity but also someone who can work quickly and do it.



John Friedlander was the sculptor responsible for creating the impressive Davros prosthetic mask worn by actor Michael Wisher. Friedlander had previously worked on Frontier in Space and Death to the Daleks and was given the simple credit of 'Masks'. He was credited as visual effects designer on The Ark in Space and The Sontaran Experiment, and received a special credit in the sixth episode of Genesis of the Daleks of 'Davros' mask'. Friedlander spoke to Doctor Who Magazine in 1981: "Peter Day was the visual effects designer on that show," he recalled. "He told me about Davros while I was between working on two shows and I had a little time free. They hadn't got an actor cast

as Davros then so I did the mask purely on spec. Peter Day did the mobile base and the back, and I did the head, the bits on top, and the hand." Friedlander created many other memorable Doctor Who monsters including the Sea Devils and the Kraals.



Davros has lived far beyond the normal lifespan of his species, and his body has naturally withered with age.

avros' internal organs, such as his heart, lungs and kidneys, have atrophied and can no longer function without external stimuli. He is encased in a mobile chair of his own design. It is a highly advanced piece of technology that he has continuously modified and improved over the years. It became the design template for the Daleks' outer casings. The chair is a life-support mechanism that sustains Davros. A device called an Energiser operates as a mechanical lung, filtering the air and supplying oxygen and other gases to his body. It also maintains his heart rate.

Davros' brain requires regular electrical pulses to its upper thalamus in order to keep it alert and coherent. The metal brace (or cranial bracket) that surrounds his head is a cerebral monitoring system, relaying information to a personal computer inside the chair. The wires that connect Davros' skull to the cranial bracket are delicate sensory probes. Nothing is more important to Davros than his intellect and cognitive ability, and he therefore maintains them in the strictest manner possible. Centuries of enhanced electrical stimulation have caused Davros' cranium to expand to an unusual size [1].



Davros' senses have been enhanced in a variety of ways. His aged eyes have been closed for centuries. He sees via his Super Optic, an artificial eye that he created. It is embedded in the centre of his forehead and linked directly to the visual cortex of his brain. The Super Optic can magnify nearby objects up to 100 times their normal size. It can also perceive X-rays and other forms of infrared light. Davros is able to see people in pitch-black darkness using a delicate heat sensor.

Davros' ears failed him centuries ago. Replacing them is an Audio Input, a device that can detect and identify sounds, including ultrasonic waves that a normal human would be unable to perceive.

The Fatigue Eliminator is a device that suppresses the areas of Davros' brain that register fatigue. Davros is capable of functioning for weeks without sleep. However, he does require occasional brief shutdown periods to rest his mental faculties.

There is a central computer known as Omnipute installed in Davros' chair. It analyses and co-ordinates all of his life support systems, registering their functions and adjusting them when needed.



Davros' voice is augmented by an in-built synthesiser that amplifies the vibrations from his vocal cords. Without it, Davros would barely be able to speak in more than a whisper. All Daleks have been programmed to respond to his synthesised voice.

The round domes that line the base of Davros' chair are sophisticated sensors. They have different functions. Some register changes in temperature; others in oxygen and radiation levels. Some detect obstacles and protect the chair from collision.

Davros never leaves his chair; it is doubtful he could survive for more than an hour without it. His legs and left arm were destroyed in a bomb attack. His spine has been cybernetically connected to the chair, allowing him to control its direction and speed by thought alone [2]. At top speed, Davros' chair can move at 20 miles per hour.

If the chair's life support systems suffer major damage, a secondary back-up system is automatically triggered. If Davros' body is injured, a regeneration program is activated which promotes the growth of synthetic tissue to repair his wounds. Simultaneously, all of Davros' organs are immediately placed in a state of suspended animation.




The central power source of Davros' chair is a small fusion reactor positioned beneath the seat [3]. It can maintain the chair's functions at full capacity for up to 50 years before needing recharging. In periods of suspended animation, it can power the chair for over a thousand years if necessary.



A Neural Reprogrammer is hidden below Davros' control panel [4]. It is a small device which, when applied to the skin of a human or a Dalek, immediately delivers an energy pulse that paralyses the prefrontal cortex of the brain – the area that governs the will. It leaves the subject completely susceptible to Davros' commands.



The control panel at the front of the chair [5] is deceptively simple in appearance. While the number of controls is small, Davros can alter their various functions with mental commands, broadening their scope considerably. Davros could in fact activate almost all of the chair's devices mentally, but he prefers to use his surviving hand to physically manipulate the controls. It is the only part of his shattered body that he can still control, and he has no desire to abandon it.




